This event is a great way to enjoy a fall day outdoors with your family and neighbors. It's not about competition for who catches the biggest or most fish, but about fishing for the fun of it and teaching our children about the pleasures of fishing.

TROUT STOCKING

Kids and parents will be allowed to help stock the pond with trout on Monday, September 30th, the time will be posted on Facebook. This is really fun to watch!! Event organizers will be available to answer any questions regarding preparations for the October 8th event.

Following the stocking, the lake will be closed to fishing until the time of the event (at 12 noon October 8th or rescheduled date). This will be enforced by council and local law enforcement.

WEATHER AND CONTINGENCY

Weather is the unknown factor. A nice sunny day and we will have a great time. If the forecast is for light rain and/or chilly weather, the event will proceed (we now have the pond shelter to provide some refuge). If the forecast is for moderate rain and high winds, we will delay the event one day until Sunday the 9th at 2:00pm. Worse case weather, we would delay one week. Any schedule changes will be posted at the lake and announced via social media.

Fishing in the Hills - Rules and Guidelines

- 1. This event is for North Hills Residents only and their non-resident immediate family (their children of any age, grandchildren, grandparents, and significant others). Any other related or non-related adult that is needed to assist a resident or family member in any capacity is certainly welcome as well.
- 2. No fishing license is required.
- From 12 noon to 2 pm Saturday October 8th, fishing will be permitted for only those children who are 14 years old or younger or children of any age that have a handicap or special need. After 2 pm on October 8th, the lake will be open to all others who have been invited to this event.
- 4. Children 7 years old and younger must be accompanied by an adult who can assist them. Parents are responsible for the conduct and safety of their non-adult children of any age.
- 5. From noon until 4 pm, each participant is permitted to catch up to 4 trout, regardless of whether the trout are kept or returned to the lake. You are encouraged to keep the trout that you catch to take home for dinner or give them to someone else that like to do so.
- 6. If you are fortunate enough to have picked a "hot fishing spot", after your children have caught their limit please relinquish "your spot" to others and consider showing others how to catch fish. We would like all children to catch at least one trout.
- 7. Participants are expected to supply their own rod and reel, stringer, and bait. Instruction and assistance will be available from "Fish Coaches" for those who request or need assistance. A few extra rods will be available for those who are new to fishing and don't have equipment or have equipment failure.
- 8. From noon until 2 pm, adults are permitted to bait and cast for the younger children, but we want to see the children reel in and fight the fish. The kids enjoy netting the fish, so please consider asking a nearby child to help do this that hasn't had the opportunity to do so.
- 9. Only one fishing pole is allowed per person for the entire day of October 8th.
- 10. Following the Fishing in The Hills event, we encourage residents to enjoy catching more trout for the following weeks. Please limit the amount taken from the lake to 4 trout per day per person or 6 per family. The trout fishing in the North Hills Lake is for North Hills residents and their accompanying guests.
- 11. This is an alcohol-free and smoke-free event. Alcoholic beverages at the lake or parking lot will not be tolerated.

Leaf Collection: November 7th to the 28th

As the leaves begin to blanket our town, we're here to assist those without the convenience of neighboring wooded lots by resuming our leaf and brush collection service. In partnership with Quality Sanitation, this program aligns with our ongoing commitment to keeping our community clean and preventing the challenges that fallen leaves can pose.

Collection Schedule: Starting November 7, 2024, and continuing until November 28, 2024, collections will occur on Thursdays, coinciding with your regular trash pickup by Quality Sanitation.

Collection Guidelines:

- Please have sacks and bundles ready at the curb by 7 AM on collection days.
- Limit of 20 sacks and bundles per household during the program.
- Each sack and bundle must not exceed 35 pounds.
- Bags should contain only leaves and brush—no grass clippings or general trash.
- Branches must be bundled, with a maximum diameter of 12 inches and a length of 4 feet.
- Torn bags will not be collected.
- The Quality Sanitation team will exercise discretion in enforcing these guidelines.

Objective: This initiative is designed to prevent the accumulation of leaves on our streets, which can lead to flooding and increased maintenance and repair costs for our stormwater drainage systems.

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We understand that for some, this may be a time of financial challenge, and we are committed to finding solutions that acknowledge these difficulties. However, we must also recognize the broader impact of unpaid fees on our community's economic health and collective pride. As such, we have begun taking necessary actions, including placing liens on properties with outstanding fees, to address this issue. This measure is not taken lightly but out of a duty to uphold the interests and well-being of our entire community.

We urge all residents with outstanding street user fees to address their balances promptly. By doing so, you contribute not only to the immediate improvement of our roads but also to the long-term vibrancy, safety, and attractiveness of our community. Your action is an investment in our shared future, bolstering both our property values and our community pride.

Recently, there have been numerous complaints regarding vehicles parked overnight in this area, which not only violates local ordinances but also poses safety concerns and inconveniences for our residents. As a response to these concerns, we are reinforcing the policy that no overnight parking is allowed on North Hills Drive. Vehicles found violating this rule will be subject to towing at the owner's expense. **North Hills Drive is not an extension of your driveway!** Please make alternative parking arrangements if necessary and help us maintain a safe and orderly community for all.

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Yes, You Can Help Keep Our Street Lights On

In our continued efforts to ensure the safety and well-being of our beloved North Hills community, **we call upon each of you**, our vigilant residents, to partake in maintaining the luminance of our streets. Should you encounter a streetlight that has succumbed to darkness, we urge you to promptly report this to Mon-Power a First Energy Company.

To initiate a street light repair, please follow these steps:

- 1) Visit the website **www.firstenergycorp.com**.
- Move your cursor over the "Customer Service" tab, then navigate down and click on "Mon Power" under the Select Your Utility section.
- 3) Place your cursor over **"Outages"** and select **"Outdoor Lighting Problem"** from the dropdown menu.
- 4) When asked, "Is power on in the immediate area of the affected light?" click "YES."
- 5) For the query, "Does the light present a hazardous situation such as: broken glass or lens; unstable fixture; exposed wires; damage, leaning, or fallen pole?" select "NO."
- 6) Choose "Streetlight" under the "Select the type of Lighting Problem" section.
- 7) Click on "NEXT" under "No Account."
- 8) Provide your name, email address, and phone number in the designated fields.
- 9) For "Lighting Location," input the necessary details.
- 10) Under "Outage Location," choose "Public Road."
- 11) In the "Problem Area" section, select "Front."
- 12) Respond to any remaining questions to complete the process.

In Case of Emergency! – Dial 911

Natural Gas Leak, call 911 and Hope Gas at (800) 934-3187.

- **Signs of a gas leak include,** rotten egg odor, discolored or dead vegetation over or near a pipeline, a hissing, whistling or roaring sound near a gas appliance or pipeline, dirt or debris blowing into the air, persistent bubbles in a water-covered area.
- o If a Leak Occurs, leave the area immediately, warn others to stay away, call 911.

Downed Power Lines call 911

- Stay at least 30 feet away, do not go near the pole or touch the line, Call 911 immediately.
- Warn Others to stay away.
